INTRODUCTION

There is still much to discover about the origins of our family, but I have chosen to put into print what has been gathered up to now, and to let younger relatives try to fill in the missing generation[s] which first came to this country.

Data on current family members was provided by someone in that branch of the family. Wherever pictures or documents were sent to me, I have tried to include them. [Those not used did not copy well.]

Much information from a century ago, especially of a personal and often trivial nature, was obtained from reading newspapers published in or near Lawrence County, Illinois, which are available on microfilm from the Illinois State Historical Library in Springfield. Principal sources were "The Sumner Press" in Sumner and the "Rural Republican" in Lawrenceville [both in Lawrence County].

Issues before 1885 were rarely available, and even after that, many individual issues and in some cases, whole years were missing. [Sumner Press had nothing for 1893 or 1899] In general, the newspapers covered the time from 1885 until 1912.

United States Census records were searched, and all those found were recorded here. [The 1890 Census is missing because it was accidentally destroyed by fire many years ago.] Where possible, a copy of the Census was made. However, some pages were in very bad condition, making copies unreadable.

The spelling of some names varied from source to source [i.e. Wagy or Waggy, Corbin or Corban]. My rule has been that I usually use the same spelling that my source material used, which can mean different spellings on the same page.

Some pages in this book have a border around them. This indicates that the enclosed data is about the family of an IRWIN in-law. Where possible, these have been placed on the left-hand side, so they can be read separately or concurrently with the IRWIN story.

I have tried to avoid errors, and ask pardon for those that escaped the editing process.

CORA and HENRY BOWEN

Cora May IRWIN was born 29 July 1883 in Four Mile Township, Wayne County, Illinois. She was a twin of Dora, who died at the age of 15 months. Her family moved back to Pasturefield in Lawrence County in 1890. Attending church with her older sister got her name in the paper when she was sixteen.

Among those from a distance who attended services here [Chauncey] Sunday, we note...Misses Flora and Cora IRWIN of Pasturefield.

The following year, she and Flora went to Champaign, Illinois, to find work. Cora was hired as a saleslady in a shop. A year later she was back home, according to the following, but returned in 1904 to the Champaign area. [These items are from The Sumner Press in Sumner, Illinois.]

- 1 May 1902: Misses Cora IRWIN and Florrie STOUT of Pasturefield attended C. E. meeting Sunday evening.
- 21 Jan 1904: Miss Cora IRWIN, who has been staying in Chauncey, is now at home.

7 Jul 1904: Cora IRWIN of Danville was home for the 4th. She visited Pearl and Perna STINE in Hazel Dell. [Danville is E. of Champaign.]

7 Sep 1905: [Pasturefield] Miss Cora IRWIN of Champaign, who has been visiting her father, returned north Saturday.

12 Jul 1906: [Pasturefield] Misses Cora and Gertie IRWIN, who have been for the past year in Northern Illinois, are visiting home.

12 Jul 1906: [Hazel Dell] Cora and Gertie IRWIN were guests of their cousins, Pearl and Perna STINE.

26 Jul 1906 Cora and Gertie IRWIN returned to Champaign.

HENRY BOWEN

Charles Henry Arthur BOWEN was born on the 22nd of January, 1888. He was the third child and only son of John and Mary BOWEN. Like his sister, Stenna, he began teaching school at the age of 18. His first teaching assignment was at Mounds.

A close friend of Henry's and co-worker with Stenna was Asa PADDICK. Henry and Asa spent much of their free time together, and through this friendship, Henry became well acquainted with Asa's younger sister, Anne. Henry and Anne were married on the 2nd of September 1908. He was 20 and she was 18. The following July, Anna became ill, and was taken to a hospital in Vincennes for surgery. Despite "all that loving hands and medical skill could do", she died on the 24th of July, 1909.

Henry moved back into his parents' home, and just a few weeks later, he volunteered to go to North Dakota to check out prospects for a new start for all the family. Before the end of November, all the BOWENs - including his parents and two married sisters - had left Illinois for Buford, Williams County, North Dakota.

Henry filed for a homestead, then went to work for Billy DISHAN, on his threshing machine. [Billy's wife, Adeline, had been Henry's first teacher, back in Illinois.] Through the winter, Henry found work as a carpenter. The following June, he was able to move to his own claim.³

As a neighbor of his brother-in-law, Earl IRWIN, he saw more of Earl's sister, Cora, as the years went by. Eventually, they decided to marry. (See CORA and HENRY BOWEN)

In 1910, at the age of 27, she accompanied her father, Corbin, on a trip to "the West". Their first stop was in Trenton, North Dakota, where Earl IRWIN, the BOWENs and others from Petty township had recently settled. Cora decided to remain there, and filed on a homestead. She worked for a time at a hotel in Mondak, Montana. [Mondak was where North Dakotans went for liquor, so it was a busy place when North Dakota was "dry", but Cora was a teetotaler.] During the next few years, she became better acquainted with the young widower, Henry BOWEN, Earl's brother-in-law, and they decided to marry. [See HENRY BOWEN]

Cora was 30 and Henry was 26 when they married on January 27, 1914, in Plentywood, Montana. Henry and Cora settled next to Earl and Julia IRWIN near Trenton, North Dakota. Besides working on their farm [where they spent the rest of their lives], Henry served for many years [1910-1943] as the Clerk of Trenton Township. Cora worked at Wilkinson's store in Trenton when her growing family didn't require all of her time. Cora was a Charter Member and first President of the Trenton Homemakers Club, and also a Charter Member of the "Forty-Niners" [which was formed in 1949].

Cora was five feet six inches tall and of medium build. She liked the activities that went into "homemaking". Henry was only five feet five and of slighter build, but strong and capable of handling all the heavy work that farming entailed. He smoked a pipe, and loved to work crossword puzzles.

Henry died at Williston, ND on the 1st of March, 1968 at the age of 80. Cora died four years later on May 17th, 1972, also at Williston, at age 88.


