

In Polk county, Oregon, during the year 1858. Hannah M. Leabo was married to Charles F. Phar, a native of Indiana, who, in 1852. came by way of Nicaragua to San Francisco and then to Oregon. He came on the same ship with Joseph Lane, who later became one of the most prominent men in Oregon, and who was most closely identified with the early history of that state. Mr. Phar participated in the Indian war of 1855, and like his friend. Mr. Lane, was a prominent factor in the pioneer affairs of the state. Mr. Phar died in 1899, in his seventieth year. 
