INTRODUCTION

There is still much to discover about the origins of our family, but I have chosen to put into print what has been gathered up to now, and to let younger relatives try to fill in the missing generation[s] which first came to this country.

Data on current family members was provided by someone in that branch of the family. Wherever pictures or documents were sent to me, I have tried to include them. [Those not used did not copy well.]

Much information from a century ago, especially of a personal and often trivial nature, was obtained from reading newspapers published in or near Lawrence County, Illinois, which are available on microfilm from the Illinois State Historical Library in Springfield. Principal sources were "The Sumner Press" in Sumner and the "Rural Republican" in Lawrenceville [both in Lawrence County].

Issues before 1885 were rarely available, and even after that, many individual issues and in some cases, whole years were missing. [Sumner Press had nothing for 1893 or 1899] In general, the newspapers covered the time from 1885 until 1912.

United States Census records were searched, and all those found were recorded here. [The 1890 Census is missing because it was accidentally destroyed by fire many years ago.] Where possible, a copy of the Census was made. However, some pages were in very bad condition, making copies unreadable.

The spelling of some names varied from source to source [i.e. Waggy or Waggy, Corbin or Corban]. My rule has been that I usually use the same spelling that my source material used, which can mean different spellings on the same page.

Some pages in this book have a border around them. This indicates that the enclosed data is about the family of an IRWIN in-law. Where possible, these have been placed on the left-hand side, so they can be read separately or concurrently with the IRWIN story.

I have tried to avoid errors, and ask pardon for those that escaped the editing process.

HARVEY and BELLE IRWIN

Harvey Stults IRWIN, the fourth child of William and Sarah, was a leap-year baby, born on the 29th of February, 1868 in Petty township, Lawrence County, Illinois. He was just three years old when his father was struck by lightning and killed. An unverified family story says that he was riding in a buggy with his father at the time of the accident.

When he was 13, he accompanied his older brother, John, to Iowa where they found work. They had been there about eight months when this article appeared.

John and Harvey IRWIN went to Iowa last fall. They are making it pay.¹

After his mother's death [when he was about 17], he lived at Birds for a while, probably with his brother, Jim. Then, after working for several other farmers, he fixed up a home on the family farm [in Pasturefield], which he seems to have inherited [perhaps neither of his brothers was interested in it]. The following excerpts from "The Sumner Press"² and "The Rural Republican"³, weekly newspapers in Lawrence County, give a good picture of his business and social life, age 18 to 23.

- 8 Jul 1886: Harve Irwin of Birds Station visited friends and acquaintances here last week. [SP]
- 9 Dec 1886: Harve Irwin of Birds has been visiting relatives in Pasturefield during the past week. [SP][Note - his grandmother lived there.]
- 16 Dec 1886: Harve Irwin is in the Pleasant Hill neighborhood, working for John Klingler. [SP]
- 4 May 1887: Harve Irwin left for the northern part of the state Tuesday. How someone cried! [RR]
- 8 Jul 1887: [Birds] Harve Irwin has returned from his northern trip. [RR]
- 23 Feb 1888: Harve Irwin has rented his farm and will work for Mr. Lathrop this summer. [SP]
- 16 Nov 1888: [Pasturefield] H. S. Irwin has sold his pony to Mr. Carver. [RR]

- 28 Feb 1889: Harve Irwin spent Sunday at Flat Rock speaking cheerful words to his best girl. [SP]
- 23 May 1889: Harve Irwin and Will Klinger of Pleasant Hill, spent Thursday and Friday in Pasturefield. [SP]
- 5 Sep 1889: Harve Irwin attended the reunion at Birds. [SP]
- 13 Sep 1889: [Pasturefield] H. S. Irwin has purchased another team of horses, and will continue business at the old stand. [RR]
- 10 Oct 1889: C. H. Wagner and H. S. Irwin went to Lawrenceville last week to work in the stave factory. [SP]
- 2 Jan 1890: Harve Irwin tripped the light fantastic at Oak Grove Wednesday night. [SP]
- 23 Jan 1890: Harve Irwin is making preparations to go into the poultry business the coming season. [SP]
- 2 Feb 1890: Harve Irwin is repairing the house on his farm, preparatory to occupying it in the near future. [SP]
- 20 Feb 1890: Harve Irwin is a victim of pneumonia. Miss Etta Irwin and her sister-in-law, Mrs. James Irwin of Flat Rock, arrived last Friday. Miss Etta will remain during her brother's illness. [SP]
- 10 Apr 1890: Harve Irwin will raise his house today on the old homestead. [SP]
- 18 Apr 1890: [Pasturefield] H. S. Irwin has been rushing the work on his house, which will soon be ready for occupation. Harve is a hustler. [RR]
- 2 May 1890: [Pasturefield] Harve Irwin sports a new buggy. [RR]
- 29 Aug 1890: [Pasturefield] Harve Irwin, our city barber, visited Flat Rock Tuesday and Wednesday of last week. [RR]
- 31 Oct 1890: [Pasturefield] Harve Irwin transacted business in Flat Rock Saturday. [RR]
- 20 Nov 1890: Our genial and pleasant young friend, Harve Irwin, has ensconced himself in his remodeled house on his farm, with all the appendages around him necessary to batching, and in order that the rolling pin, flat iron and broom may have the desired effect, he must throw them as the African does his boomarang, that it may rebound back to the thrower. Harve says he is boss now, and everything must be done to suit him. [SP]
- 12 Mar 1891: We understand that Harvey Irwin has rented his farm to O. Baltzell for next season. [SP]
- 19 Mar 1891: We learn that Harvey Irwin is going to start for Washington State the 1st of April in company with Samuel Brookhart and family and Rev. Dr. Mack of Sumner. [SP]
- 26 Mar 1891: Harvey Irwin has sold his farm to Oliver Stout of Chauncey, who will in the near future move his family to said premises. This leaves Harvey entirely unencumbered

here and supplies him with means to make a good investment when he gets to Washington State. [SP]

9 Apr 1891: Harvey Irwin with the Brookhart and Mack families arrived at Coulee City, Washington, last Monday. [SP]

4 Jun 1891: Harvey Irwin has entered 100 acres of land 28 miles Northeast of Waterville, Washington. [SP]

As mentioned above, Harvey bought a farm in Washington State, north of Waterville in Douglas County [near Bridgeport]. Since that was on the East side of the Columbia River before the days of irrigation, it may have been suitable only for wheat. It is probable that he found extra work in the orchards across the river, because during this time he became an expert in the care of fruit trees. Five years later, in the summer of 1896, he found work in Larene, near Davenport, Washington. It was here that he met Anna Isabelle HANSEN, a young school-teacher. [See HANSEN - MCNEW FAMILY.] THE SUMNER PRESS continued to record his adventures.

10 Sep 1896: H. S. Irwin, a former citizen of Petty township, removed from Bridgeport, Washington to Larene, in Lincoln county, same state.

7 Apr 1898: H. S. Irwin, formerly of Petty township, has moved from Larene, Lincoln County, to Dyer, Douglas County, Washington.

Harvey married Belle HANSEN on the 6th of May, 1898 in the town of Waterville, Douglas County, Washington.

2 Jun 1898: [article from The Sumner Press]

From the Waterville Wash. "Empire" we clip the following item, which will be of interest to the many friends of the groom here:

Married - At the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Mann in Waterville on Friday evening last, May 6, 1898, Harvey S. Irwin and Miss Annie I. Hansen, Rev. B. E. Koonts officiating. Mr. Irwin is one of the early young settlers of the western section of Douglas county and is widely and favorably known. The bride is a young lady who has formerly resided at Larene in Lincoln county, where Mr. Irwin has spent the last two or three seasons. For a few weeks past, she has been teaching the school in the Cold Spring Basin. On Saturday, Mr. and Mrs. Irwin returned to their home at Pleasant Hill, thirty five miles northeast of town where they will permanently reside.

He was 30 years old and she was 21. Along with Belle, he also took three of the younger HANSENS into his household [Clara 17, Lulu 8 and Russell 5]. They spent their first winters running a small store and Post Office at Blewett Pass in the Cascade Mountains. Belle was

HANSEN - McNEW - CAWOOD - MONTGOMERY¹

Jeremiah and Phillis MACKNEW came to Charles County in Maryland colony in 1668. Phillis came as an indentured servant, and worked for five years to repay her passage. At about the same time, Stephen and Ann CAWOOD also arrived in Maryland. [Stephen was killed in an Indian War in 1676, and his widow received the first pension granted for a war casualty in Maryland - 1500 pounds of tobacco per year for three years.]

Both families, MACKNEW and CAWOOD remained in Maryland for two generations, remaining in Charles and Prince Georges Counties [south of where the District of Columbia was later located]. This is in the area between the Potomac River and Chesapeake Bay. In the 1750s both families moved west to Frederick County, Virginia [now West Virginia], and in the 1770s, moved further southwest in Virginia, along the Shenandoah Valley, to an area not far from the Cumberland Gap. There, in 1806, William McNEW [b.1785] married Elizabeth CAWOOD [b.1788].

Their son, Moses [b.1820], went to Kentucky where he met and married Clarissa COLE [b.1829] in 1844. She was descended from Alexander MONTGOMERY Sr and Jr, both of whom fought along with Daniel BOONE in the Revolution. Her grandfather, John COLE, died while serving in the 1812 War, for which her grandmother, Isabelle MONTGOMERY COLE, collected a pension.

Moses was originally a farmer, [as in 1850 Census], but found time to study medicine, and opened a medical practice in Owsley County, Kentucky in 1853. Moses and Clarissa had eight children, the last of whom was born after Moses died from typhoid fever in 1860. The wife and children survived on a small Kentucky farm through the Civil War. Clarissa applied for homestead land in Nebraska, and the family moved there in 1873.

One of the daughters, Mary Ann [called Mollie], was married in Nebraska in 1875 to a Danish immigrant, Albert Christian HANSEN. [He was born in the province of Schleswig, which was "annexed" by Germany in 1864. Albert, along with many other Danish men, left rather than be conscripted into the German Army.] Their first child, Anna Isabelle, was born in Phelps County, Nebraska on 24 July 1876.

In 1882, after too many years of drought, grasshoppers and other problems, the Nebraska land was sold, and the whole family [including Clarissa, her married daughters and their families] moved by covered wagon to Washington territory, taking up "railroad land" in Lincoln County [not far from Spokane], in an area called Larene.

Postmistress during this time.¹ Their first child, Verna Blanche, was born in Chelan on the 22nd of February 1900, and their son, Howard Harvey, was born two years later in Dyer on the 25th of January 1902. Soon thereafter, Harvey sold the farm and purchased an orchard in the Okanogan valley. At the same time, he served as Postmaster, first at Cashmere, and later in Okanogan. He also continued to keep in touch with his Illinois friends, through The Sumner Press.

21 Sep 1905: H. S. Irwin, formerly of Petty township, has moved from Blewitt, Washington to Cashmere in the same state, and asks us to change his paper to that address. [SP]

19 Jan 1911: We note that Harvey S. Irwin has been reappointed postmaster at Okanogan, Washington. Harve's many friends here congratulate him on his preferment. [SP]

Harvey and Belle moved to Okanogan in about 1906, and the youngest of their three children, Marjorie Isabelle, was born there on June 15th, 1907. In 1908, Harve was chosen as a delegate to the Presbyterian General Assembly in Kansas City, which gave him an opportunity to revisit his birthplace.

25 Jun 1908: H. S. Irwin arrived here last Sunday after an absence of seventeen years from the county. He is living in Okanogan, Washington, where he has prospered in this world's goods. He left there about the middle of May and represented the Wenatchee Presbytery in the General Assembly that met at Kansas City recently. [SP]

8 Jul 1908: H. S. Irwin left Tuesday morning for his home in Okanogan, Washington after a two-week visit here with old-time friends. [SP]

In 1910, Belle IRWIN had her chance to attend a convention, again through their church.

[The Sumner Press, June 23, 1910]

"From the Okanogan, [Wash.] Independent we note that Mrs. H. S. Irwin writes from Washington, D.C., a glowing account of her experiences at the world's Sunday school convention. In closing she says "Washington is certainly a beautiful city and I am enjoying myself immensely but will be glad to get back to Okanogan and get a breath of fresh air."

Friends and relatives from Illinois sometimes found their way to Okanogan.

9 Sep 1909: D. E. Wagner and E. S. Petty left Saturday for a month's trip through the Northwest, including a stop at Seattle for the AYP [Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition].

Anna Isabelle HANSEN, who was six when this move occurred, finished school at sixteen and became a teacher. Two years later, her mother died, followed a week later by a younger sister, and her father suffered a breakdown, leaving Belle, eighteen, and her sixteen-year old brother, Tom, to support and care for their younger sisters and two-year-old brother.

In 1896, Harvey IRWIN went to Lincoln County to work, and some time that year or early in 1897, he met Belle HANSEN. She saw a successful, nice-looking and God-fearing man, 29 years old. He saw a very earnest, hard-working and family oriented young woman of 20. It was not surprising that they soon became serious about one another. They were married in 1898. See "HARVEY AND BELLE".

They will also visit H. S. Irwin and L. M. Wagner at Okanogan. [SP]

In 1910, Harvey's cousin, Otto IRWIN, moved to Okanogan. Later that year, Ott's father, Corbin [Harvey's uncle] came for an extended visit. [See chapter on 'Corbin and Charlotte' for an account of his trip.] Then in 1912, Harve's older brother, John moved to Okanogan.

Off and on in the following years, Harvey worked in his Okanogan orchard. When business was not good, he took work wherever he could find it, often in the Puget Sound region. The orchard was sold during the mid-twenties, and from then on, Harvey and Belle lived in or near Seattle.

Harve had health problems for much of his life, but still managed to work hard and live long. He developed diabetes when he was in his thirties [before Insulin was discovered]. He was near death at one time, but somehow survived. He then worked out a very strict diet for himself which enabled him to recover and return to work. According to The Sumner Press [Sept 21, 1911] he also suffered a bout with typhoid fever. When he was 68, he was hit by a car and seriously injured. [The driver panicked after running over him, and backed up, doubling the damage.] He was not expected to live, and certainly not ever to walk again, but after many months of recuperation, he was able to return to work.

Both Harve and Belle worked well into their seventies; Harvey as a gardener and a night watchman, Belle as a cook at a children's home and then a hospital.

Harvey's grandchildren were looking forward to celebrating his 20th birthday (80 years) the following February, but cancer claimed his life in November 1947, at the age of 79. He and his daughter-in-law were taken to hospitals the same evening. He died on the 9th, and his youngest grandchild, David IRWIN was born on the 10th. Belle survived Harve almost 15 years, dying on the 5th of August, 1962. They are buried in Acacia Cemetery, just north of Seattle.

Harvey was a devout Christian, always making time for prayer and reading his Bible, no matter how busy he was. He was a gentle and loving grandfather, and liked to garden with his grandchildren. He was a meticulous workman; whatever he planted thrived, and whatever he built never needed repair.

Blanche IRWIN

BLANCHE

[Verna] Blanche IRWIN was born in Chelan Falls, Washington on the 22nd of February, 1900, and was listed in the Census of that year when only a few months old. She attended schools in Okanogan, Seattle and Tacoma, graduating from Okanogan High School in 1919. In 1920, she and her brother, Howard, went to Seattle to attend the University of Washington. After a year there, she obtained a job as a typist, and from then on, until her retirement, was always gainfully employed - sometimes the only one in the family with a steady income.

She returned to Okanogan, where she worked for the County government. In about 1938, she moved to Olympia to work for the State of Washington. In 1943, she made a final career move to the Great Northern Railway Freight Office in Seattle, where she spent twenty-five years, retiring in 1968. She died in Seattle on the 12th of August, 1985 at the age of 85. The cause of death was a stroke. She was buried in Acacia Cemetery.

Blanche was active in Eastern Star and the Natural Foods Association, often holding an office in the latter. She loved to dance, and kept this interest even in her 80s. She was always close to her family and showered her nieces and nephews with thoughtful gifts. She was the one who regularly wrote to any family member away from home, beginning in her teens with letters to her Uncle Jim, whom she never met, and later with letters to nephews in the service.

HOWARD

Howard Harvey IRWIN was born on the 25th of January, 1902 in Dyer, Washington. He was 31 when he married Margery Payne TRUEWORTHY on January 13, 1933 in Seattle. He worked for a number of different employers from the 1920s through the early '40s, including the Post Office and Bonneville Power. He then became an agent for the John Hancock Insurance Company, working at this until his retirement.

Like his sisters, he was an excellent dancer, and also liked to play golf. After his retirement, he and Margery moved from Seattle to Lacey, Washington, where he died at age 85 on December 8th, 1987 from complications following surgery.

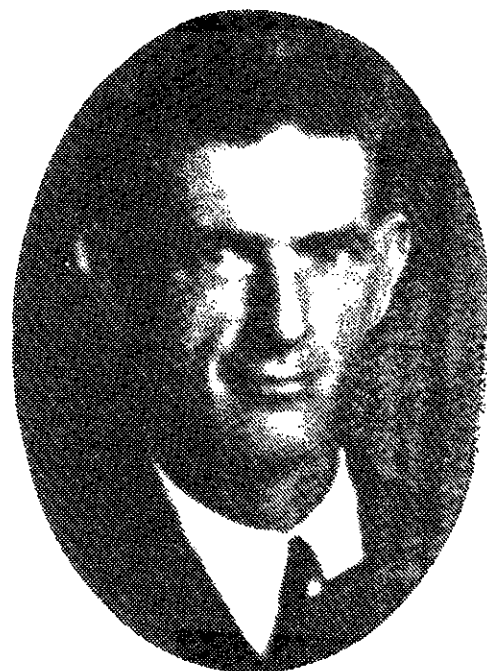
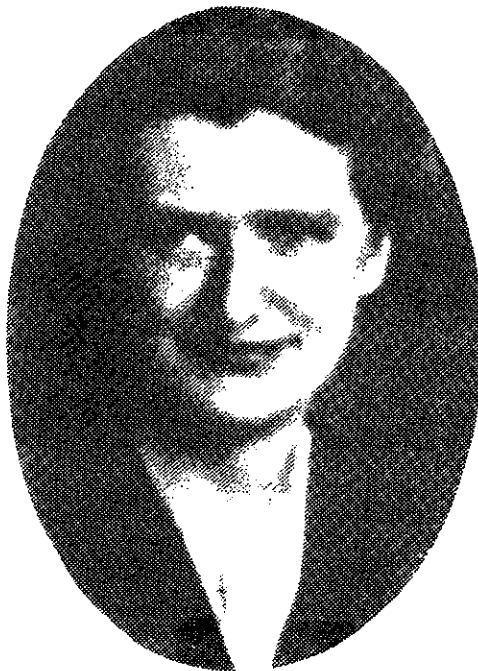

MARJORIE

Marjorie Isabelle IRWIN was born June 15, 1907 in Okanogan, Washington, the youngest child of Harvey and Belle IRWIN. She graduated from Okanogan High School in 1924. Like her sister and brother, she loved to dance, and accompanied them to the local dances that summer. It was at one of these that she met Joe MOLLOY from Seattle, a semi-pro baseball player with the Hibernians. His schedule brought him to town several times per season. Marjorie and Joe danced beautifully together, and whenever he was in town, they would meet at the dance. That fall, she entered Western State Teachers College in Bellingham, and managed an occasional short trip to Seattle to see Joe. She turned 18 during the summer of 1925, and in September she and Joe were secretly married, as her family did not approve of either Irishmen or Catholics. The birth of their first child the following year brought the family together, and Harvey and Belle became devoted grandparents. In the following years, they added seven more children to their family.

In the 1950s, Marge worked for several years for a frozen food company. In 1960, after her husband retired from the Post Office, she took the Postal clerical exam, and in 1961 began working in the Greenwood P.O. in Seattle. She remained there until her retirement in 1976. Joe died in 1970, a month before their 45th anniversary. She died at age 74 on the 31st of January, 1982 of heart failure, aggravated by lung cancer. She was buried in Calvary Cemetery, Seattle.

Marjorie was devoted to her family. As one of her children said, "She spoiled all eight of us." She faced tragedy without complaint [i.e. the deaths of two children at birth and that of a ten-year-old son from leukemia, the serious wounds suffered by her oldest son in Vietnam and his later death from cancer]. She adopted all things Irish, and loved to host St Patrick's Day parties.

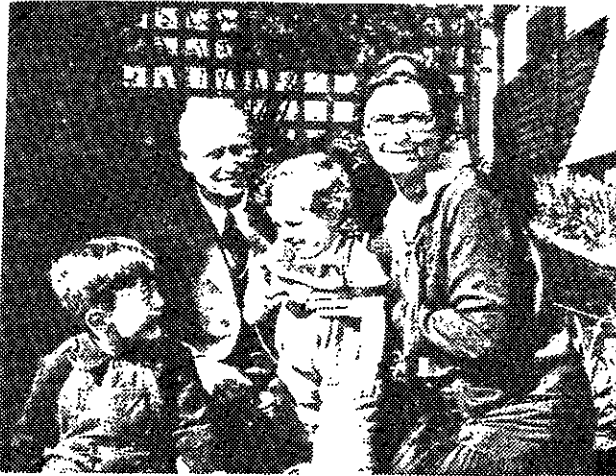

A trained nurse from Seattle is caring for him and he is getting along as well as could be expected. His many friends in this community sincerely hope for his speedy recovery.

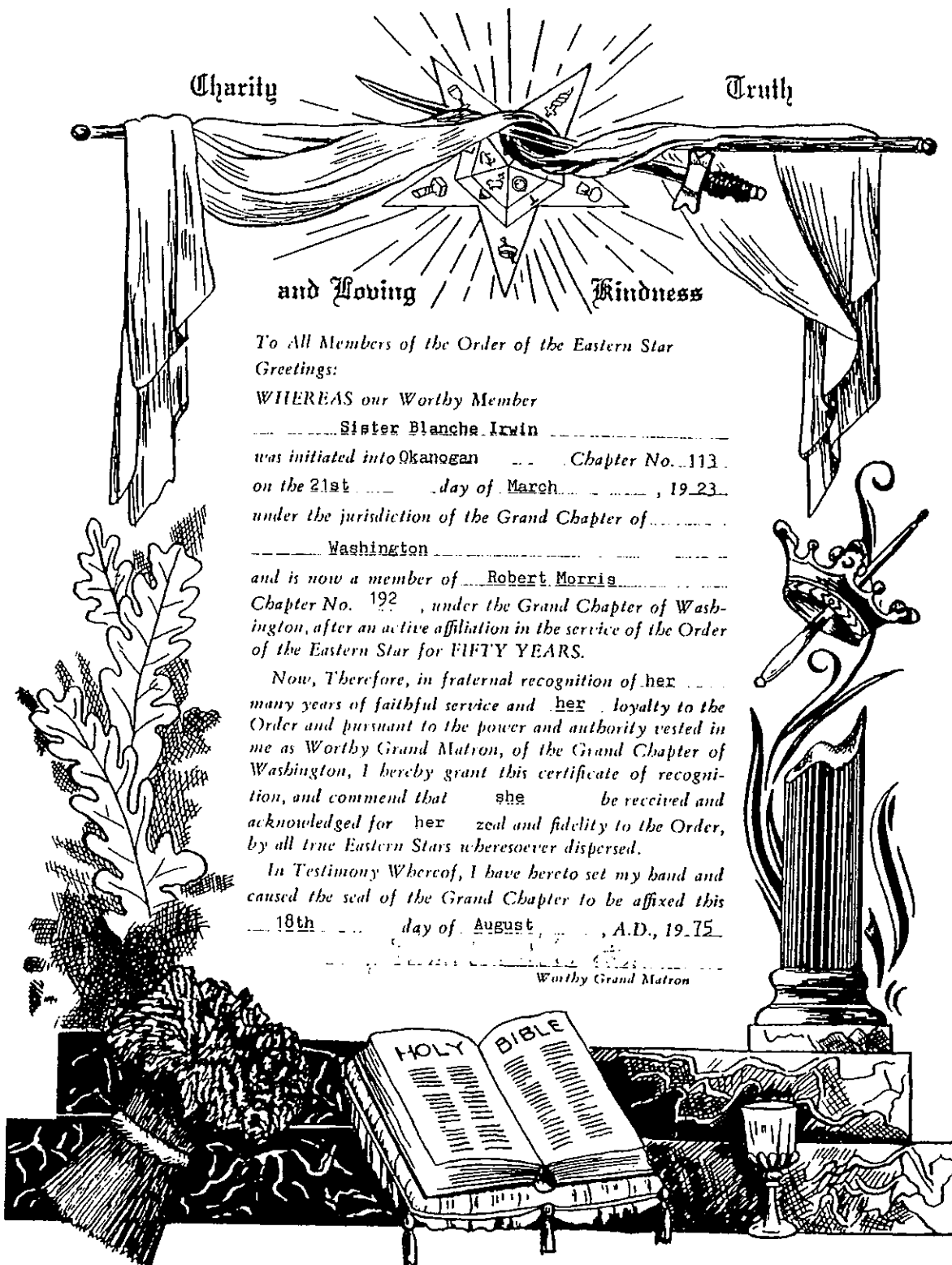
